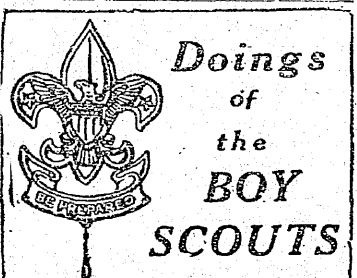

TWO WOMEN ON JURY TO HEAR SHOOTING CASE

TWO WOMEN
GREENCASTLE, Ind., May 3.—Two
women are named on the jury in the
case of William P. Hackett of Green-
castle, whose trial on a charge of
shooting Miss Hilda Varney, a De-
Pauw university student, with intent
to kill, last December 4, got under
way today in circuit court here. The
women are Miss Laura Ammerman
and Mrs. Ida Dobb.

Hackett said at the time of the
shooting that he heard someone near
his garage and believing an attempt
was being made to steal his automo-
bile he fired to frighten them, he said,
and the bullet struck Miss Varney in
the back. She was standing in a drive-
way in the rear of the Hackett home
with Mark Bills, another DePauw student.
The place was said to have been
a favorite gathering place for
many students.

JAP AMBASSADOR 'OPTIMISTIC-BUT'

Shidehara Says His People are Assimilable in Intel- lectual Way.

CLEVELAND, May 3—Difference be-
tween the United States and Japan
"call for adjustment, but their ex-
istence does not justify apprehen-
Shidehara, the Japanese ambassador,
declared today in an address before
the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce.

Taking up the Japanese question on
the Pacific coast, the Japanese am-
bassador reiterated the declaration of his
government that Japan claimed "no
right, nor has she any intention in fact
of sending emigrants to this country."
"She has held consistently to the
policy of placing restrictions upon such
emigration," he continued. "She only
asks for nationals lawfully resident
in this country that just and equitable
treatment which is in line with the fine
traditions of the American people. She
desires nothing more—nor can she be
satisfied with anything less.

Referring to the statement that the
Japanese were not assimilable, the am-
bassador says that when given the op-
portunity and privilege the Japanese
were capable of "intellectual and spir-
itual assimilations which are compat-
ible with good citizenship, manhood
and loyal service to the community
in which they reside."

"But does it seem quite fair," he
asked, "to condemn men for keeping
alive old allegiances so long as they
are denied the privilege of forming
new ones? Every man must have a
country and loyalty to that coun-
try is supreme."
