Troops Sent to Island. Honolulu, Sept. 16—National guard troops have been sent to the island of Lihue Kauai where riots between striking Filipino plantation workers and members of the constabulary have resulted in three police and 13 Filipinos being killed.

A company of guard troops and a seaplane was dispatched by Governor Farrington.

The trouble started when police sought to free two Filipinos held by strikers at their headquarters. Strikers attacked the police with knives and clubs. Police resisted with the same weapon, according to reports, until the strikers opened fire, and then replied in kind.

FOUR ARE DETAINED AFTER FINDING OF MURDERED MAN

Pittsburgh, Pa., Sept. 16—Mrs. Mary Catula, 22, is being held by police here today in connection with the death of her husband, Frank, 31, who was found murdered in his bed apparently hacked to death. A bloodstained hatchet was found on the floor.

The wife told police she found the body when she returned from visiting her physician.

Two brothers of Mrs. Catula and her father also were detained.

Sentence Will Have Effect

Columbus, Ohio, Sept. 16—"Public opinion resulting from the Loeb-Leopold sentence will have its effect with juries hearing murder cases in the future and they will undoubtedly deal much more generously with minors," Joseph Godown, assistant county prosecutor here said today commenting on the Bernard Grant case in Chicago.

"Legally, the Loeb-Leopold case cannot be mentioned in court," said Godown, "but it will have a nationwide effect just the same."

Evangelist Is Arrested

Ottawa, Ill., Sept. 16—Rev. D. C. Linton, an evangelist conducting a series of tent meetings in La Salle county, has been bound over to the grand jury on a charge of carrying concealed weapons. He was arrested with his chauffeur, Dewey Miller of Peoria, on warrants secured by William Transen, a Ransom drug-gist.

According to the charges, the evangelist went into the Transen drug store, and displaying two guns on his belt, and said he was a federal prohibition agent. Rev. Linton denied this and displayed a permit to carry a gun issued by a Chillicothe, Ill., Justice of the peace. He gave Peoria and Pana as former residing places.

Giant Policeman Is Dead

Chicago, Sept. 16—Policeman Conrad Magnuson, one of the giants of the Chicago police force, and nationally known as the anchor of Chicago's tug of war teams, is dead today at his home. He succumbed to an injury received two years ago while exerting his great strength to lift a motor out of a police boat.

SHOE STYLES ARE BEING DISPLAYED IN PEORIA

Peoria, Ill., Sept. 16—The footwear that the fashionable maids and matrons of Illinois will wear during the coming winter and spring will be displayed on the dainty feet of 22 of Peoria's prettiest to shoe merchants of the state who gathered here today for their annual convention. The girls will act as models in a style show arranged as a feature of the convention.

The program for the three days of the convention includes addresses by prominent men of the footwear industry on trade topics. Arthur Schuelten, of Rockford, president of the state association, will preside at the sessions. Officers will be elected and next year's meeting place chosen the concluding day.

Made Only One Move

St. Louis, Sept. 16—Mrs. Clara Gobay Gorman, one of the last members of a pioneer family has made her first and only move—to Calvary Cemetery. She lived all her life in a drab little two-story house in which she was born 87 years ago.

Her sister, Miss Julia Gobay, and a cousin, Augustus Labadie, 80, the last two members of the historic Labadie family, continue to live in the little home, which is now surrounded by a sturdy industrial district. They are the only surviving members of the Labadies.
